### Administrative Item: 1.3 Member Initiatives

Jamil	Jamil will be a speaker at the Rapid Response Roundtable, Thursday, October 18, 2013.
	Jamil attended a Roundtable headed by Secretary of Labor Hilda Solis, on Monday, October 15, 2013. East LA Community College received a grant for logistics from the Department of Labor (DOL). Riverside was invited because logistics is a growing industry in our area and there are upcoming grant opportunities for the Inland Area focusing on logistics.
	San Bernardino County WIB will arrange a joint meeting with our Riverside WIB. An upcoming date is being determined.
	The youth trip to Washington D.C. was very successful. The agencies and staff we meet with were glad to see how well our youth program is working.
	Congresswoman Bono Mack and her staff were very impressed with our youth in DC. Jamil invited her to visit one of our Youth Opportunity Centers YOC and she agreed. Jamil is arranging a date and time for the tour and will let everyone know the outcome.
Morris Myers	Morris asked about the outcome of the @LIKE Evaluation Funding. This was item number 1.2 on the September 12, 2012, Executive Meeting Agenda. The funding recommendation is schedule to go before the Board of Supervisors on November 6, 2012, With the recommendation that the funding amount not exceed \$900,000.



Information Item: 2.1 Program and Fiscal Report

Presented by Overview	Felicia Flournoy           Program Reports – members received the WIB Report and Critical Measures for review. Felicia gave and	
Overview	overview of the measures and stated that workforce development is trending well to the measures. There continues to improvements on all measures trending towards 100 percent.	
	Morris asked if the Virtual One Stop System was used to collect any of the data needed for these reports concerning follow-up on customers who have left our program. Felicia responded yes, but because jobseekers automatically fall out of our system after 90 days of no activity and no hard exit is completed on these individuals we can't track for follow-up data. The new State system will track this type of data.	
	Morris asked if we track our candidates' progress for a year or two after they are hired to see if they retain employment. Felicia responded yes but not for that long. Employment is tracked for the first and third quarter after employment. She explained that our objective in the critical measures to make sure we are meeting our business customers' needs by referring the right qualified candidate for each job request.	
Actions	Mary Jo requested that objectives successfully reached on the Dash Board be changed from Red to Green. The acronym <b># of UI</b> (Number of Unemployment Insurance Customers) will be spelled out in on future reports.	
Presented by	Zaskia Ruiz-Jones	
Overview	Fiscal Report. Zaskia went over the fiscal report with the members and addressed their questions and concerns. Fiscal year 2011/2012 is complete and the books have been closed on it. Ten percent of funding was spent on administrative costs, 82 percent was spent on core and intensive services.	
	We began gearing up for SB 776 which increases the percentage of funds spent on training by 25 percent. We began the 25 percent increase in Fiscal Year 2011/2012 by enrolling customers into ongoing training. We will begin paying the costs for the training Fiscal year 2012/2013. Training dollars are at \$5.6 million this includes training that is current and training that will be allocated to the 25 percent requirement.	
	Zaskia and Felicia explained that we have a two year window to spend our formula funds for Adult, Youth and Dislocated Workers. 80 percent of the funds must be obligated in the first year and then 2 years to spend the money.	
	Morris how the reduction in administrative costs were achieved. Zaskia explained that some reduction was through attrition and some reductions were from staff being assigned to other funded projects. Rapid Response received an increase and it will go towards training like On-The-Jo and other types of training.	
	Riverside, San Bernardino, and Imperial Counties were awarded a Department of Labor's Innovative Grant for \$6 million that is to fund a 4 year project. Zaskia went over the spending plan for the @LIKE program. \$1.9 million will be spent in the first year. \$120,000 in administrative costs and \$1.4 million will pay for contracts that are in process for the project. The remaining balance will be spent over the future years.	
	Business Service costs are a combination of costs. \$1.3 million was allocated for business purposes last year and the same amount is projected for next year. The business customer is one of our most important customers and we wanted to insure that their needs are being met through our funding allocations.	
	Members asked if our funding was predetermined and Felicia responded yes, but there can be some blending of Adult and Dislocated Worker funding when necessary. Zaskia gave a quick historical overview of the funding received over the past 12 years. For Fiscal Year 2011/2012 we had total funding of \$21,879,779 and a carryover of \$9 million into this Fiscal Year. We are projected to receive a total of \$28 million in funding for this Fiscal Year. We continue to review our budget to make changes and updates to reduce our cost and optimize our services to our clients.	
	Members asked besides WIA funding where the other dollar amounts come from. Felicia explained that they are competitive grants from the state and other sources. Members asked to see more on the other funding sources.

The CWIB is made up of 34 governor appointed members and 10 mandated members (2 assembly members, 2 senators, and 6 department heads). October 30 and 31, will be their two day retreat.</li> <li>I have been doing presentations at Rotary Clubs in the area. The Monday Morning Club has asked me to do a presentation for them on November 14<sup>th</sup>.</li> </ul>

Director's Report			
Felicia Flournoy	The Southwest region is working on doing a Youth Opportunity Summit that will bring graduating high school students who are not planning to go to college together. We want to help them understand what types of opportunities there are in the community colleges, as well as work periods in our industries. The event will be held towards the end of March 2013.		
	The West region is working with Norco Community College and the West Adhoc Committee to put on a supply chain technology forum in late January2013. To showcase what is happening in this region and get input from logistic companies in the west region on this new emerging occupation.		
	Felicia will be a member of the CWIB's Issues and Policy Committee.		
	We have an opportunity to start youth ecology project in Diamond Valley Lake in collaboration with Northern California. Northern California has a successful model in Sonoma County with Metropolitan Water District (MWD). Northern MWD is working with Southern MWD, the community colleges and the YOC to start this project in Diamond Valley Lake in Hemet. We hope to expand it to Blythe and the Salton Sea. This program combines class training with paid work experience. Students will be out cleaning trails and debris around the lake. They will make sure the wildlife habitats are in place. They will work with biologists and learn about the environment, conservation and will certifications. There is a possibility of the students being hired by MWD after completion. There will be a meeting of the core groups and then we'll plan a summit out at Diamond Lake. We are now at 54 percent private sector membership on our board. We are looking at inviting Suzanne Lingold of Cal State San Marcos to join the board to represent the universities.		

Public Comments		
Lea Petersen	The Gas Company in developing an initiative for workforce readiness. It is a grant program of \$5,000 to \$25,000 in funds. Lea asked the board to assist with how to define the program, identify the target audience. This does not fit their usual scope for hiring candidates. The Gas Company knows they will be losing roughly 50 percent of their workforce over the next five years. These employees need to be replaced but their HR department is not focused on massive hiring, which is where the company wants to go. We need your help developing our policies and our message for the youth.	
	The Gas Company is looking to give employment opportunities to small minority business companies. She asked for help on finding these companies. Kathy Boyer asked for written information on the program to train her Business Solutions staff. Staff can begin prescreening and referring some small business to the Gas Company.	
	The University of Riverside contacted Lea and she gave a presentation to 50 representative of the India government who are here on a special two week program. They are ministers, heads of states and department, military commanders. They are here learning how public and private partnerships work. Lea contacted Tom Freeman, Riverside EDA Office of Foreign Trade, the chambers and others to possibly get together for a meet and greet with these individuals.
