West	Kenneth Clark – the West Committee covered several topics. Lupe Del Gado and Felicia talked about the training program Schneider Logistics provides to youth. Lupe created an educational opportunity for youth to work and learn how logistic companies operate. Similar to a journeyman's program. The West Committee is considering having a committee meeting at Schneider's.
East	Lee Haven – the East Committee discussed the Strategic Plan and developed sup committees. The East wants a copy of the marketing tools to present at events their members attend. They want to begin coordinating data to align with information coming from the emerging industries. Information such as what type of education they want their employees to have and what certificates will they accept. The East would like to give this sort of information to schools so that they can begin creating curriculums for their students.

Chair	Mary Jo Ramirez The Innovative Grant is complete and submitted to the Department of Labor for evaluation. This was a collaborative regional grant with Riverside, San Bernardino and Imperial Counties. It will address the needs of young adults between the ages of 21 to 28 years. This particular age group is overlooked by many entities and data suggests that they are having challenges in the adult world.
	Voices for Youth advocacy group is preparing for their Sacramento trip. We are also planning open houses at the YOCs for our congressional representatives. Four members of their group gave a presentation at the National Youth Employment Coalition in San Diego.
	 PSET: Youth Portal - The group is working on the youth portal to address the funding concerns and reduce the cost. We are looking at getting sponsorships. LEAP magazine - this is a successful program that we want to do again. We are also looking a ways to reduce its cost and get continuous funding. Character Counts - will be held April 27, 2012, at the Riverside Marriott. We are honoring 9 youth. Three
	 school scholarships will be awarded. YOC – the YOCs continue to seek out funding opportunities. This is an ongoing process and it is getting very competitive. RCOE – we partnered with RCOE who took the lead on the Youth Build Grant. We are partnering with them to leverage our funding.
